Trade-o-ree Listings:

As many of you know, ISCA has always maintained a trade-o-ree listing on our website. We have recently changed the management of that section of our website and when you click on the "trade-o-ree link", it will take you to bsator.com. As stated on the website, BSATOR.com is a free service to help promote Boy Scout Trade-o-ree events taking place throughout the country. The information is gathered by asking people to submit their information and also from other Scouting websites and trade-o-ree organizers. It is managed by ISCA board member Brian Ives. Most trade-o-rees that are listed have an accompanying flyer that you can download and many of them have pictures from the prior years trade-o-ree to give you a better feel of what to expect if you were to attend. At press time, there were 40 trade-o-rees listed for the remainder of 2016 and another 11 were already listed for 2017. A summary is also posted in each quarter's Journal.

ISCA Donor program Update:

In the last ISCA Journal, it was announced that we had kicked off a new ISCA Financial support package or "Donor Program." It has started strong and over \$1,000.00 has already been donated. A special donor ISCA patch will be given to each donor over a certain amount and each donor, if they haven't already, will soon be receiving a complete package in the mail detailing their individual benefits. This statement will be posted on the ISCA website and in the Journal when completed.

Report on Central States Scout Museum Fire

Many of you have heard by now of the tragic fire that devastated the Central States Scouting Museum in Larned, Kansas on April 1, 2016. Most of us that try to preserve Scouting's history through local museums and our private collections probably have nightmares about the loss of irreplaceable Scouting memorabilia due to fire, flood, or natural disaster.

Many thanks to Ryan Meador (ISCA # 919L) for supplying much information on the fire and for his continuing efforts to help in the museum recovery and for setting up a means for donations.

Basic facts:

The museum was located in a 1940's small car dealership building in Larned, Kansas. Charles Sherman, the curator, lived in an apartment above the museum. The museum had 85 mannequins and 95 displays. Charles estimates that there was about \$500,000 in memorabilia on display.

Reports are that Charles is doing pretty well, all things considered, he is still a little dazed but the support of the local community and Scouting friends has been outstanding. Charles had packed items in his car to see how much it could hold and had yet to unpack, so some items were saved. He still plans to attend the Trade-O-Ree in Kansas City in late April, so hopefully some of you saw Charles at the Trade-O-Ree. He is making plans to reopen the museum in a new location, but he will need help to do so.

The building was a total loss and estimates are that 5-10% of the museum contents were recovered. Unfortunately, most of

what was recovered is no longer of museum quality and were damaged by fire, smoke, or water. A collection of Scout musical instruments is gone. Many local Kansas council and camp items were also destroyed. Some great 1933 & 1937 Jamboree items were lost in the fire. The list of items lost is too long to list here. However, some of the better items were salvaged and efforts are being made to restore them. Many people have been helping with the recovery and an inventory of what all was saved is yet to be made. It is believed that the fire probably started with a propane space heater, but nothing is known for sure at this time.

As tragic as this story is, the real story is in the response to the fire. A dedicated 83 year old who has spent much of his life building this collection comes out of it dazed but determined to rebuild the museum. Citizens of this small town in Kansas came out to help their neighbor to sift through the debris and to salvage what they could. Staff from the local Fort Larned museum and the county museum stepped forward to assist with conservation efforts. Two local buildings were made available to house salvageable items, a local business provided two new freezers to help remove moisture from damaged books. Scouters Ryan & Randy Meador drove 4 and a half hours early the next day to Larned to assist with salvage efforts and returned again the next week. Many other Scouters have also pitched in to help where they can. Many offers of financial donations and promises of donated memorabilia came from Scouters all over the country.

How can we help? Right now the key issues are dealing with the destroyed building and finding a new building to house the museum. Then new mannequins and display cases need to be secured and installed in the new location. So for now hold off

on sending memorabilia, there is no place to put it. The best way to help right now is through monetary donations to help with providing a new location and displays. If you have a source for mannequins and display cases in good condition those would probably be useful in the rebuilding process.

The Central States Scout Museum is a 501 c 3 Not for Profit Organization, so donations should be tax deductible. Checks can be made to Central States Scout Museum and mailed to First State Bank, 116 West 6th Street, Larned, KS 67550. A gofundme account has also been set up to accept electronic donations (<http://www.gofundme.com/ScoutMuseum>).

If you want to track progress, Facebook seems to be the best medium – progress reports are periodically posted on the Scout Patch Collectors Facebook Group and Ryan Meador has been putting regular pictures and reports on his Facebook account. Jason Spangler has also been providing updates in his weekly newsletters. Also, I will try to include progress reports in my future Scouting Museum column.

If you are interested in donating memorabilia in the future when a new location is found I would recommend emailing Ryan Meador (meadorre@yahoo.com) to see if what you have will fit into the collection.

If you can help in the recovery of the Central States Scout Museum that would be great. When there is a new location – help spread the word, donate items, and stop in for a visit on your way to Philmont. You can also help by visiting and getting involved in a Scouting museum in your area! By working together we can help preserve and share Scouting's rich history.

I would be interested in learning what measures ISCA members are taking to document and protect memorabilia in museums that you work with or in your private collections. We can't prevent all disasters but we can reduce risk factors and BE PREPARED to handle things in case emergencies arise. I see a strong probability of a future article on how we can be good stewards of collections.

SCOUTING HISTORY - BITS & PIECES

The Mystery of the Scholarship Merit Badge

The Scholarship merit badge is one of the original named fifty-seven merit badges first offered by the Boy Scouts of America

in the 1911 edition of the Boy Scout handbook. It is also the only one of the original fifty-seven merit badges that did not have any requirements yet decided upon and approved when the 1911 handbook was first published. The other fifty-six badges all had their requirements included in the handbook. It said in the first printing of the BSA handbook in 1911 on page 41: "Scholarship - NOTE: The requirements for the merit badge for Scholarship had not been decided upon when this book was published. Information about same may be secured upon application to National Headquarters."

According to the 5th annual BSA national report in the merit badge summary the first Scholarship merit badges were awarded in 1913 and ten were awarded that year. In the December 1, 1913 issue of Scouting Magazine on page 1 it was announced that a "new merit badge" named Scholarship was available. This would seem to indicate that the ten 1913 recipients all earned them in December of 1913 or close to it. In the May 1914 issue of Boys Life on page 22 it was announced "A New Merit Badge...The design for the Merit Badge of Scholarship has just been completed. It is published here for the first time." This means the ten 1913 recipients could not have received a actual cloth badge until likely April or May 1914. With that said Stephen H. Porter earned it in mid 1914 and his badge is the design everyone is familiar with, meaning without the wreath and clouds. The 1914 Porter Scholarship badge is pictured (top right). The announced design was the same that was actually awarded in the early years except it included in the design a wreath around the border of the icon and also had clouds that the hand holding the torch came out of. (see illustration)

The two requirements to earn it was also included in the May 1914 announcement. The first requirement was you had to attend any level of school for twelve months. The second requirement was that you had to have a certificate from your principal stating that your attendance had been satisfactory, your deportment (behavior) had been above average and that the overall average of your grades was satisfactory." This did not seem too hard to accomplish and the following year in 1914 the number of Scouts earning it increased twenty fold to 197 awarded.

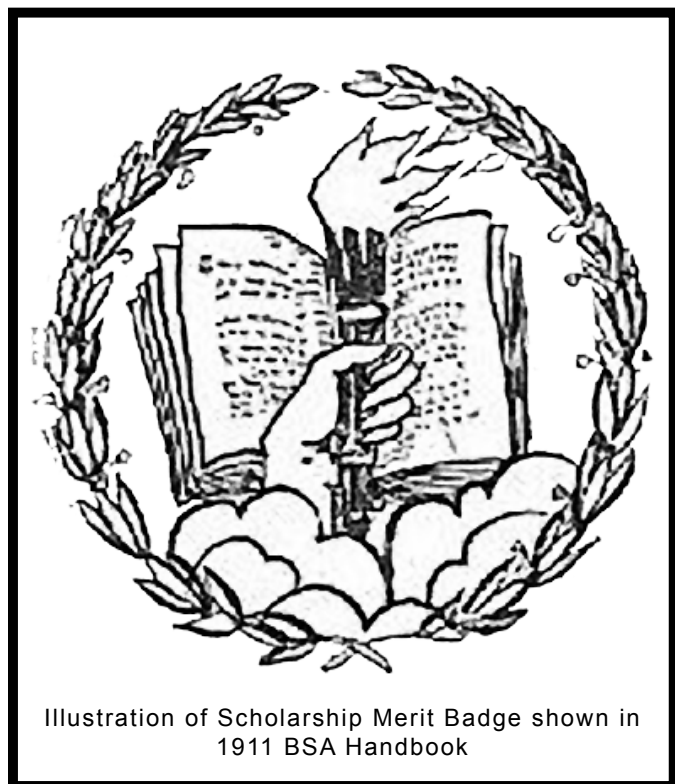


Illustration of Scholarship Merit Badge shown in 1911 BSA Handbook

So what happened? It appears the Badges and Requirements Committee simply put it on the backburner as far as finalizing the Scholarship merit badge requirements and badge design although the over two year time lapse



of 1913, it did not exist except in name only during those years. There was only 56 merit badges actually available to earn originally and not 57 although there were 57 named in the 1911 BSA handbook. How do you earn a merit badge that has no established requirements? And the badge design they first published in May 1914 is not what they awarded, at least not to Stephen H. Porter who received his by mid year 1914. The reality is there was not fifty-seven merit badges available to earn in 1911 or 1912 or most of 1913 but only fifty-six merit badges. There was not 57 merit badges that could actually be earned until late in 1913. This fact is further verified by the BSA published official 1913 and 1914 Boy Scout calendars that had actual photos of every merit badge that existed on each calendar each of the two years. You can count them and there is only fifty-six pictured on each calendar and not fifty-seven. The one merit badge that did not exist yet when the calendars were published and was not pictured with the others on the calendars was the Scholarship merit badge. The name existed in 1911 and 1912 but not the badge. With all that said I believe there could still be a Scholarship merit badge out there that survived that includes the wreath and the clouds although it likely was a prototype that they ended up rejecting for whatever

reason. One thing is for sure and that is that there was not 57 official merit badges that could actually be earned until late in 1913.

seems very excessive. It was long enough that they reintroduced it as a "new" merit badge in late 1913. It is no wonder that none were awarded in 1911, 1912 or most

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Tulpe Lodge 102 Issues Flaps

Tulpe Lodge 102 has been formed within Narragansett Council by the merger of Tulpe Lodge 245 and Abnaki Lodge 102. They issued flaps at their banquet in February, 2016. The flap with a green border they consider their first. A second flap with gold mylar border was a gift

for lodge officers and committee members who helped with the transition into the new lodge. They are also issuing a charter member flap, with a different design and red border, later for those paying their dues.

We have merger news from other parts of the country also. First, Revolutionary Trails Council (Ga-Hon-Ga Lodge 34) and Otschodela Council (Oterororaus Lodge 402) have merged to form Leatherstocking Council. The name comes from the series novels by James Fennimore Cooper (The Deerslayer, Last of the Mohicans, etc.) set in upstate New York around the Seven Year's War (mid 1700's) and known as the "Leatherstocking Tales." No word on whether a new lodge is coming soon.

In southern California, San Gabriel Valley Council (Ta Tanka Lodge 488) and Los Angeles Area Council (Siwinis Lodge 252) have merged to form the Greater Los Angeles Area Council. In March a combined committee considered submissions and selected Tuku'ut Lodge as the name and the saber tooth tiger as the totem. The name is taken from the Tongvan language (a southern California tribe) and means "bobcat" or "mountain lion" (the Tongva did not have a word for the saber tooth cat, which was probably extinct by the time of their arrival in the area). They are not planning on using a lodge number and are now considering a design for their first flap.

In Florida, Gulf Ridge Council (Seminole Lodge 85) and West Central Florida (Timuquan Lodge 340) merged on May 1. In Illinois/Indiana, Lincoln Trails Council (Woapink Lodge 167) and Prairielands Council (Illini Lodge 55) appear close to a merger. In these last two cases, we have heard nothing about the OA lodges.

We also hear that the new Pathways to Adventure Council centered in Chicago is working through many issues in forming one organization out of four pre-existing councils. Because of these difficulties, the four OA lodges are expected to remain in operation until at least the end of 2016.

Dave Pede of Illinois wrote to us in January with the interesting story of a long lost Illini Lodge 92 neckerchief. He sent us a copy of a lodge newsletter written just after the 1948 NOAC that details how the seven members of the Illini contingent decided on their second day that they needed their own neckerchief to "make their presence better known at the convention." They found materials somewhere and then drove to a Singer Sewing store nearby in Bloomington. Shop personnel crafted together seven neckerchiefs, one for each delegate. The ladies at the store were apparently very happy to help and the delegates do-

nated several boxes of chocolates in thanks. The newsletter goes on to say that other members would get a chance to see their lodge's first neckerchief at the lodge conclave later that year.

Sixty-five years or so later, Duane Fowlks of Texas searched for the seven delegates and eventually found them or their descendants. He located two of the neckerchiefs and acquired one. The family who has the second says they plan to donate it to the BSA National Museum. A third may or may not exist. The rest are reportedly long gone.

The neckerchief is blue cotton cloth with orange piping, white "WWW", and an "I" made from three wide strips of orange ribbon (one down the center and cross pieces at the top and bottom). As the longtime Blue Book editor for Illinois, Dave is of the opinion that the crafted "I" on the neckerchief is not going to be cataloged as the lodge's first badge. This is the photo of the neckerchief, which will be cataloged now as the lodge's first, the N1.



In February an extensive collection of OA lodge pie shapes (quarter circles, triangles, etc.), both on and off neckerchiefs, was offered on eBay and the sale caught the attention of Paul Myers. In conversations with Paul he pointed out that OA pies were once a premier area of OA collecting. That was partly because a lodge might make only one loom run of these patches, maybe 50-75, and they were often very restricted (one per member was common). They were the most important insignia for many lodges for years, especially those that did not issue a flap patch until the late 1950's or early 1960's. Brothers wore them with pride at NOACs and conclaves, for example.

Pie shapes were actively sought by men who collected OA numbers (the only option for some lodges), all issue collectors (there once were many of these), lodge 1-100 collectors, plus lodge, section, and state collectors. With the spread of the pocket flap and later the popularity of first flaps, interest in the pie shapes fell

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off. Paul thought he saw that diminished popularity reflected in the prices realized in this recent pie shape collection sale, many of which brought a fraction of what he remembered being their values even ten years ago. The pies that brought the highest prices are in the following table. Several others had high minimums and did not sell, and may be offered again.

Paul believes he owned at one time the premier lodge 1-100 collection but he remembers not chasing the pie shapes aggressively because they were so expensive. When he broke up the collection, one of the pies he did own, the Sinawa Lodge 73 P1, sold for \$1,800. The last one to sell on eBay brought \$430.

Jason Spangler reported in one of his eBay Scouting Hot Finds email broadcasts about a group of 100 old patches donated to a troop in Tennessee. The leaders were shocked to learn some of these patches might be worth four figures. The new owner's researched prices realized and offered the patches in two groups on eBay. These key pieces sold in their first sale: Wetassa Lodge 227 R1 \$5,600, a Koi Hatachie Lodge 345 F1 for \$1,250, a Black Beaver Lodge 281 X1 WAB for \$585, and a Nishkin Halupa A Pe Lachi Lodge 489 F1 for \$650.

At their winter banquet Wulapeju Lodge 140 issued a two-piece set marking their 45th anniversary. The set is remarkable because only 25 were made and the asking price (or donation?) for a set was \$250. We were told that one set sold in their lodge auction for over \$350 and two sets were sold outright, leaving 22, perhaps for a long time.

Bryan West reported via Facebook that Wachtschu Mawachpo Lodge 559 issued a special OA Centennial flap for officers and advisors at their 2015 awards banquet in January. The flap is identical to their earlier centennial flap with black border, except with a gold mylar border. Bryan says 25-27 were made.

While seeking information on a new flap from Catawba Lodge 459 we came across a virtual collection of many of the patches on their lodge web site. They provide good images of their patches and information not easily found elsewhere, like the name of the manufacturer and how many were made. One feature of interest is that they catalog their patches according to their own numbers (CL# or Catawba Lodge #) and Blue Book number (BB#). We noticed they disagree with the Blue Book on their first flap. They consider the BB F2 their first flap and the BB F1 their second.

When Yah-Tah-Hey-Si-Kess Lodge 66 first ordered flaps to mark one of their members serving as the 2008 National Chief, they were disappointed that the arrowhead and sun symbol in the top left corner were embroidered in pink thread, not red as they ordered. We hear they re-ordered to get the red and put the pink flaps in storage. Now eight years later, they are issuing the flaps repurposed as breast cancer awareness fundraisers. They have labeled the flaps on the back, 500 for anyone to purchase and 500 for lodge members only. They say the borders are different

and they may be slightly so, but the blue mylar used for one is hard to distinguish from the blue thread for the other, without the labels available to read.

Last time we discussed Joe Hupp's collection of flap shapes and other badges issued by lodges before their accepted official first flap for uniform wear. One of those flaps was the 1955 Area V-E conclave flap, issued by Quinipissa Lodge 479 before their first flap or even their first chapter flap. We watched a nice example of this conclave flap sell on eBay in January for \$214.

Related to that, we got a chance to talk with Tom Jones of Louisiana at the Indianapolis TOR and learned that he and his father had taken their Ordeals in Quinipissa Lodge 479 the same summer (different weekends) and both were given the now very rare 479s1. This gave us a chance to inquire again why that flap is so rare. Although he did not know for sure, he had this possible explanation.

The 479s1 was given to members, including those undertaking their Ordeal the year Tom joined. But when the year turned, no one in the lodge was informed it was time to pay dues again. Perhaps there was a change in lodge management or someone dropped the ball, but the lodge apparently neglected to contact members for the new year.

When Tom attempted to renew his membership on his own, he was told there was a late fee. A little irritated to learn he owed a fine when he had never been informed about paying dues, he just didn't pay and essentially left the lodge. He suspects that a great many members fell off the rolls at the same time for the same reasons. All of these brothers had been issued the 479s1 and those flaps went away with the lost members. So, one possible explanation for the rarity of the 479s1 is that the majority of the brothers who received one left the lodge almost immediately. When the lodge got its administration back in order they issued the s2, but the s1's were gone and mostly forgotten.

Much of this story was originally reported by John Snead in the Journal of The American Scouting Historical Society, #7, 1999. John says all of the S1 flaps were issued at just one Ordeal. Most of those went on uniforms or to Scouts who never got active in the lodge. The difference between the S1 and subsequent flaps was not even discovered until years later, by which time most of the S1 flaps had disappeared.

In February, Richard Turner of Nentego Lodge 20 wrote to report three new flap shapes from his lodge released at a lodge brunch. The first is for the 2016 Goldfish program. Goldfish members pay one fee and can attend all lodge activities for the year. Members could buy two of this flap at \$10 each, but not clear if that was a year or event limit. We have seen other lodges offer similar programs for paying all event fees at once, sometimes with a patch.

The other two Nentego flaps are military service appreciation fund raisers. The flaps are identical except for the color of their details—gold mylar on one and red on the second. The gold mylar flap was sold with a two per member limit at \$25 each. The red details flap was also limited two per member at \$10. The lodge intends to support a military veteran's cause to be announced later.

Mark Yuasa of Oregon posted to the Facebook Scout Patch Collectors group regarding a three piece NOAC 2015 set offered on eBay that appeared to be from Esselin Lodge 531. Since that lodge had merged away several years ago, this had to be

a private issue, probably made to trade for legitimate patches or sell profitably. The set consists of a CSP shape, a flap, and a chevron. All have an orange-red background.

Joe Hupp wrote us again later asking if we knew anything about segment for the Horseshoe Bend Trail patch from Alabama, then being offered on eBay, which showed an arrow across a horseshoe. Having no idea what this was we wrote to Larry Faulkner of Alabama, a very knowledgeable collector and researcher of trails. Larry knew exactly what the small segment was and gave us the following information.

The horseshoe crossed by the arrow forms an A, which stands for Alibamu Lodge 179. Members of the lodge who helped keep the trail operational earned the segment. The A also appears on other memorabilia from the trail, including a neckerchief. The segment, neckerchief, and other items showing an arrow may eventually be cataloged as OA insignia. The trail patch and segment together sold for \$107.



Ma-I-Shu Lodge 363 has begun using the number 111 on their patches, starting in 2015. 111 is their council number. And although we are now in 2016, we hear that Ma-I-Shu Lodge is issuing seven patches commemorating the OA centennial of 2015.

We have seen a photo of the badges, which include three two-piece sets (flap and CSP shapes with green, silver mylar, and gold mylar borders) and a large round back patch.

In January a Tribe of Gimogash back patch sold on eBay for \$1200, with only one bidder at the minimum. The seller described the badge as being from the personal collection of an early Region 12 volunteer who was the first Scout Executive of Greater Salt Lake Council. But the seller could not attribute the badge to any particular camp, saying it could have come from any in Region 12.

Also in January a group of 1930's and 1940's paper and insignia items from Valley Forge Council sold on eBay for \$2025 after 14 bids. The 1937 National Jamboree patches and other contemporary felts were badly moth eaten, but the key piece was probably a short, white, cloth sash or armband. This displayed a black arrow pointing left and the words "Ordeal" above and "Honor" below the arrow. The cloth looked about the weight of a pillow case and there were no straps or grommets or anything else suggesting how it was worn or used. This item was previously unknown to us and we have been unable to learn more about it.

Still in January, Bill Topkis reported the addition to his totem pin collection of a silver Nentico Lodge 12 pin, this one showing the traditional Nentico eagle standing with spread wings on an arrow, as portrayed on most lodge insignia. The pin was unknown to current lodge members but Bill tells us the provenance traces to the lodge. He did not have an accurate date for the pin, but provisionally assigned it to the late 1940's, early 1950's.



In February a member of Tulpe Lodge 102 offered their new first flap on eBay as a buy-it-now offering for \$10, we believe on behalf of the lodge. The first time we saw it the listing noted that 94 had been sold. It was relisted and 61 were sold and then a third relisting we noticed in early March noted 33 sold. This is a marketing initiative new to us, at least for first flaps.

Shawnee Lodge 51 issued an earned centennial flap in addition to other centennials that were fundraisers. To earn the special flap members had to be engaged with a variety of lodge and council activities over a ten month period, including attending a long term camp. Members had to meet requirements and get a card signed for each, and then turn in the card in order to buy two of the special flaps.

We hear that the National Sea Scout Committee has approved the OA flap for wear on the New Century Universal uniform.

Occoneechee Lodge 104 issued a special Sea Scout flap at their Spring Pow Wow, March 18-20.

Mike Conkey ran another big blind OA flap trade in January and we took part again, sending ten. This time he had 26 participants and about 2,100 flaps changed hands. Some traders submitted 100 or more. It is usually an opportunity for us to trade for a few new flaps we can publish, but we also get older issues. For at least the second year in a row we received back a 50 year old Unami Lodge 1 S2. Someone must be sitting on a pile of those. Below is photo of Mike's table with the flaps all sorted and ready to be mailed.



Nick DeMarco has been collecting flaps issued as cancer awareness fundraisers and sent us the image of a new one from Woapalanne Lodge 43. This one is targeted at pancreatic cancer in support of a Vigil member suffering from that disease. The flap includes this individual's Vigil name with the lodge name. Earlier, Nick had reported to us three flaps issued by Nokona Lodge 150 as cancer awareness fundraisers. Their bronze mylar flap (S78) sold for \$20, the silver mylar border (S79) sold for \$30, and the gold mylar border version (S80) was only available if the complete set was purchased for \$75.

Two Wah-Pi-Kaw-Me-Kunk Lodge 512 F1 first flaps (rarity 8) sold on eBay in March and April. The first was apparently mint and sold for \$898 after 30 bids. The second had a thread break repaired at the manufacturer (the word "LODGE" was added manually) and sold for \$555 after 23 bids. The mint example in the Dave Thomas collection was priced at \$1,600, about 10 years ago.

Jeff Ansley reports that Wauna La Mon'Tay Lodge 442 issued two flaps for their Arrow Corps 2016. The flap with black border is a fundraiser selling for \$10 plus shipping, 350 made. The flap with blue border is for those attending, 200 made. For information on ordering, contact Jeff at skyloo442@comcast.net. Their Arrow Corps projects include repainting watch towers and trail work at Mt. Hood National Forest and Willamette National Forest/Mt. Jefferson Wilderness Area. The lodge will also be issuing two flaps commemorating one of their members serving as National Vice Chief. In April the lodge will issue a flap celebrating their council's 100th anniversary.

Brad Estabrook writes that Echokotee Lodge 200 issued at their winter fellowship two flaps and a CSP to celebrate their 75th anniversary. The trader flap is semi-ghosted with red border and white background, and sold for \$6. The second flap has a semi-ghosted black background, dark gold border and lettering. Only 75 were made, individually numbered, limited to one per person, and sold for \$40. Flap #1 was raffled off; tickets were five for \$5, and thereafter \$1 each. The CSP is also semi-ghosted with white border and red background.

Mike DeLeo, past chief of Wulapeju Lodge 140, has come across some early newsletters and documents from predecessor lodge Wettassa 227. In all of the documents the lodge name is spelled Wettassa, with two T's. Mike is hoping to do further research and discover when and why the name was changed.

Rick Obermeyer has written to tell about the significance of the design of the standard Tipisa Lodge 326 flap, which is essentially unchanged since first adopted in 1965. The twelve arrows represent the twelve parts of the Scout Law. The quiver that holds them is for the Brotherhood that binds us together. The Bow is the bow you tested the first night of your Ordeal. The calumet, or peace pipe, stands for the friendship and fellowship in our Brotherhood. The rising smoke stands for the ideals of our Order that stay with us as we rise through life. The shield stands for Service, to which the chapters, represented by feathers, contribute. He notes that as the number of chapters has changed over the years, so have the number of feathers.

Rick also shared that their name in Lakota Sioux means "red tipi." A Sioux village was arranged in a "U" open to the east. One of the end tipis would be for the chief or medicine man and it would be painted red. If a visitor came to the village, the leader would be expected to provide hospitality in his red tipi. Thus "Tipisa" can be loosely translated as "The Lodge of Brotherhood." It is a tradition that every lodge or chapter activity patch has a small red tipi on it someplace.

Last time we wrote about different ways that people do, or might collect OA. We heard from Rich Price of Pennsylvania with a twist on first flap collecting. When he got down to roughly a dozen first flap needs, finding those became difficult and expensive. He then started collecting first flaps still on uniform shirts. He found it interesting to see them in the context of the whole shirt and other insignia. He now has over 100 such shirts, but as you can imagine, storage is starting to become an issue. Only 600+ to go.

Quick Comments:

- Catawba Lodge 459 has issued a flap commemorating their council's 100th anniversary (Mecklenberg County Council 1915-2015; 700 made).
- Curtis Heisey tells us the Chippanyonk Lodge 59 flap with the rock climbing raccoon was the lodge's 2013 Jamboree flap, issued with no reference to the event and without a chevron.
- An Itawamba Lodge 235 Zs1 private issue sold on eBay in February for \$380 after 11 bids.
- Last time we described the first flap from Pennacook Lodge as an s1, but it should have been a W1.
- Takachsin Lodge 173 has issued a two piece set for the OA centennial that notes on the bottom part the predecessor lodges and organizations that form the lodge's history: the Tribe of Gimogash, Tipisa Order of the Red Arrow, Ojibwa 173, Me-She-Kin-No-Quah 269, and Tipicon 425.

- In addition to the multicolor OA centennial flap we published earlier this year, Blue Heron Lodge 349 also issued purple ghost and white ghost centennial flaps.
- Trey Walls mentioned on Facebook that Tonkawa Lodge 99 is now going by the name Tonkawa 99, incorporating their original charter number directly into their name.
- Guneukitschik Lodge 317 has issued a flap to raise money for local families of fallen police officers that are sold for \$10 (400 made).

In lodge badge listings below, we add the numbers made in brackets when we are given that information from our source of the image or if we are able to scan the QR code on the back of a patch in our possession.

On our submission day, there were 51,025 OA lots for sale on eBay, with 3,868 being auctions (54,100/7,784 last time).

The following badges did not sell on e-Bay when there were no bids at the seller's minimum, which we list, or the item was bid upon but did not reach the seller's reserve (DNMR).

Scouting Museums

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I will admit it; I am a Scouting memorabilia “junkie.” I love to look at old scout stuff, learn about Scouting history, and yes collect memorabilia as well. Whenever I travel, I try to visit Scouting related museums and enjoy looking at all the awesome stuff.

A while back a member of Patch-L posted the question – Is there a list of Scout museums available? This was a great question that peaked my curiosity, so I went online to do some research. I found several lists and when I compared them I discovered that they were all great lists, but all of them were missing some museums that were listed on other lists. Plus, a few of museums I knew of were not on any of the lists. The best sources that I found were:

US Scouting Service Project (www.ussscouts.org/scoutmuseums.asp) – Contains great information on lots of Scouting museums, has links to many different Scouting museum web-sites.

“Museums and places of interest for scouts on tour”, by Michael F. Bowman and Fred Webb – This is a good list that is available on the US Scouting Service Project web-site. It includes some information on locations, hours, contacts etc.

The Stevenson’s (www.thestevensons.com) – There used to be a spread sheet listing Scouting museums, now it will link you a few resources including the National Museum web-site.

Wikipedia – Scouting Museums (www.wikipedia/wiki/Scouting_museums) a surprisingly good list with links to Scouting museums worldwide.

The Scout Patch Collectors Base Camp (www.patchcamp.com) – Has links to several different Scouting museums.

I am sure that there are other good lists out there, but these were the ones I found in my research. I took these lists and combined them. I then added a few museums that I was aware of that were not listed on any of the above sites. I also got some excellent input from Bob Sherman and Dave Eby, who are curators of Scouting museums in Connecticut and Ohio. Special thanks to Chris Jensen for hosting a version of the list on the Streamwood web-site (www.streamwood.net) Others who gave input were – Steve Austin, Dale Burris, Harry Thresen, Mitchell Pierpont, Wilbur Williamson, Steve Adams, Bob Walton, Sam Fairchild, Donald Tuttle, Louis Smith, Peter Glass, Greg Anthony, FT Rick Bedsworth, Rick Obermeyer, and James Waters (among others). We are hoping to get a list on the ISCA website, but are still figuring out formatting and criteria for listing. In the mean-time a modified version of the list can be found on the Streamwood web-site (www.streamwood.net) or send an e-mail and I would be glad to forward my list to you. I would appreciate any help in correcting information contained on the list or adding any additional museums that may have been missed. I have limited my list to museums in the United States, there are also many great Scouting museums located in other countries around the world but time, knowledge, and space dictated that I limit my list. Please check with any museum before you visit it to ensure that it is still in existence, what the operating hours are, location, and

any fees. Some of the information on the various lists may be outdated or incomplete.

Some Scouting members may be members of The American Alliance of Museums, Federation of Scout Museums International, or other regional/state museum associations. These groups provide some guidelines and standards under which their member museums operate. However, even though a Scouting museum is not a member of one of these groups, it can still be a legitimate museum and fun to go see.

What constitutes a “Scouting museum” is the subject of a lively debate. Some feel that if it is not at a permanent location (i.e. a mobile display) it is not a museum. Some believe it needs to have set hours to be a museum. Others believe it needs to be owned by a council or a not for profit organization to be considered a legitimate museum. Another school of thought is that it needs a certain number of items in the collection to be a true museum. While there are many opinions out there, what really matters is that we are preserving Scouting history and making Scout memorabilia available to be viewed by current and future generations, as well as educating Scouts, Scouters, parents and the public on Scouting’s rich heritage. Thousands of dedicated volunteers and museum professionals put countless hours into developing and maintaining Scouting museums and displays throughout the country – thanks for all of your efforts!

There are many types of Scouting museums out there:

- BSA council owned and operated.
- Public museums.
- Non BSA - Private or Not for Profit museums.
- Unit owned and operated.
- Not-for-Profit (501 (C) (3) corporations.
- Privately owned.
- Operated by OA Lodges.
- Owned and operated by the Girl Scouts of America (GSA).
- Council/Camp museums that are controlled by a group of dedicated volunteers but may not be owned and operated by the local BSA Council.
- Virtual Museums – available online.

Museums are also varied as to locations. Some are located at the local council service center, many are at BSA camps, some are part of public or private museums, some are in private facilities, some are mobile displays that get hauled around to various events, some are online, and some are at national BSA facilities. A few museums are located in multiple locations (camp, Council service center, portable display). Some museums have fees for

entrance and many are free to visit. Check with the individual museum before you go.

Some interesting statistics from the museums that I found:

I found information for Scouting museums in 40 of the 50 states. I did not find any listings for Scouting museums in: Alaska, Alabama, Hawaii, Idaho, Kentucky, Louisiana, Montana, North Dakota, Rhode Island, and Wyoming. There are probably museums in some of these states that just did not show up in my research. Let me know if any museums were missed in these states.

States with the most Scouting Museums (that I know of): New York – 12, Texas & Massachusetts -9 each, Michigan – 7, Ohio & Illinois –6 each, California & Georgia – 5 each.

I found information for more than 150 different Scouting museums/displays/monuments in the United States. I am aware that this information is incomplete, so please help update the list. Some of the museums have displays in multiple locations (council, camp and portable for example). Of those museums on this list it appears the break down is:

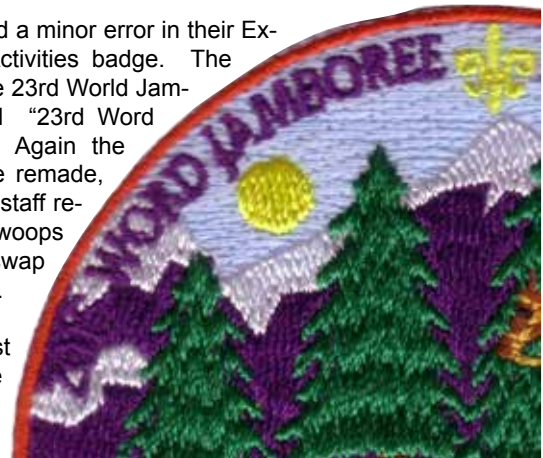
2015 World Jamboree Whoops

Every World Jamboree has had various items produced that just did not come out as expected. None of the items offended anyone, but at the time produced a smile or laugh.

At the special BSA contingent leaders' reception each Scout association was given a walking stick made for inviting them to the 2019 World Jamboree. They were produced by Gail Roper of Orem, Utah. He has produced hundreds of walking sticks. To make the 5-foot walking sticks, Roper begins with 10-foot lengths of wood, cuts them in half and routers the indentations made to facilitate gripping the stick. Next, he sands, stains and puts a coat of sealant on the wood, then sands again and re-coats before using the laser to decorate the sticks with words and images.



BSA also had a minor error in their Exhibits and Activities badge. The letters for the 23rd World Jamboree stated "23rd Word Jamboree". Again the badges were remade, but the BSA staff received the woops badges to swap or give away.

scarf had a problem: it could represent someone being in distress. The ribbon edging, which included the Canadian flag, was sewn on upside down. The second issue was corrected and anyone having the first issue could trade it for the corrected version at the Canadian HQ.



But in making the 2015 World Jamboree walking sticks there was a slight mistake. Iceland and Ireland are closer than we thought, one letter. Note, Iceland and Ireland did receive corrected walking sticks.

North American countries were not the only ones with woops. Solomon Islands had the Jamboree site Kirara-Hama as Kirira-Hama. They produced a corrected version before the Jamboree, but a few woops got out.



OA members gathered in their uniforms and OA sashes on the morning of August 3rd at the World Jamboree BSA Headquarters in Japan. A special recorded message from National Vice Chief Donnie Stephens was played to the U.S. contingent to signify the start of the 100th anniversary NOAC. To commemorate the event of the Order of Arrow a special BSA authorized commemorative flap was to be made. Attendees could order the flap. Early in March 2016 the flaps pre-ordered started to ship.

Even the host country had a woops for their Join In Jamboree badge prior to the Jamboree. The Japanese were all encouraged to wear the special 68 mm round sublimation/embroidered badge. One of the lots of the JIJ badge had the sublimation printing misspelling MONDIAL as MONIDAL.



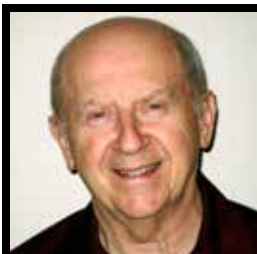

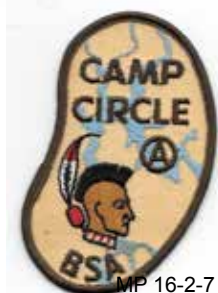

Update On CampImages.com

As faithful readers of the ISCA Journal know, I have a great interest in collecting camp patches. Several years ago, Doug Hunkele did a superb job setting up a website called campimages.com (the Site) where 1000's of images of camp patches were shown.

After administering the Site for many years, Doug turned the Site over to ISCA. I volunteered to be the ISCA Board representative to the Site and to help revitalize and improve it. Mark Scheiderer is the new webmaster. Dick Cordes will serve as an advisor along with other individuals.

We have decided to FREEZE the Site for the time being. As wonderful as the Site has been, we feel it can be improved by eliminating duplicate images, correcting camp and council identifications and cleaning up the Site in general. We are not and will not accept any submissions of scans until further notice.

We are looking for dedicated State editors who will begin this revitalization process. If anyone would like to serve as an editor or assistant editor or would like to recommend someone for these positions, please contact me as soon as possible. State Editors and the National Editor will be responsible for changing the content of the Site and to add new scans to the Site when we are ready to accept them.

The webmaster is analyzing the current Site to determine if it will be adequate for the future or if a new site will have to be con-

structed. ISCA is going to have one master server to serve the needs of the Blue Book OA data, the CSP data and the campimages.com data.

Once the clean-up process has been completed and everything is in place to accept additional scans not currently on the Site, we will make a formal announcement to ask the patch-collecting public to start submitting scans. However, until we make this request, additional scans will NOT be accepted so please do not send in anything at this time.

The Site will initially focus on camp patches but will have the capacity to include other types of camp memorabilia in the future. The Site will have the most complete list of BSA Councils available to collectors and historians. Future editions of The Camp Book 2 will have an indicator to identify which camps listed in the book have patches illustrated on campimages.com.

The new Mission Statement of campimages.com is:

The goal of campimages.com is to display images of all types of memorabilia produced by BSA camps including, but not limited to, patches, neckerchiefs, slides, articles of clothing, equipment, activity patches held at the camp, etc. The website will be owned by the International Scout Collectors Association (ISCA) and will be administered by volunteers with an interest in recording and preserving the history of BSA camp memorabilia.

Barack H. Obama “Scouting’s Centennial President”

From the “bully pulpit” in the Oval Office, the nation’s chief executive always has communicated his appreciation for the Boy Scouts of America and their legacy.

Barack H. Obama is no different.

of our greatest presidents and certainly one of our greatest conservation presidents ... [whose conservation] legacy is an extraordinary achievement,” President Obama declared at the April 16, 2010, signing ceremony of his America’s Great Outdoors initiative.

In recognizing the importance of Roosevelt’s vision of outdoor preservation, Obama introduced his own objective: re-introduce Americans to our nation’s natural wonders.

“Americans are blessed with a vast natural heritage,” Obama wrote. “[We] take pride in these places, and share a responsibility

Spending some of his young life in Indonesia—home to the greatest number of Scouts in the world at over 15 million—his mother believed it important for him to be a member of the

Cub Scouts, known as the Siaga. While a resident of Jakarta, Obama—then known as “Barry”—was recalled by a former classmate as being a “good kid” who partook in the program at the Besuki Elementary school from 1970–1971.

“We learned, at that time, how to use rope for building camp tents, [and] climbing,” recalled his former Scout friend. “But Barry Obama never got the chance to camp outside the city ... he went back to Hawaii in 1972.”

Elected to the U.S. presidency in 2008, the nation’s first African American chief executive, Barack Obama presided as BSA’s Honorary President during the organization’s centennial year celebrations in 2010.

“Our Nation’s future depends on how well we educate the next generation of leaders,” he wrote in a message delivered to the anniversary gala held in a Washington, DC, hotel during a February 2010 blizzard. “By building a strong foundation of service, character, and active learning, we can open doors of opportunity for our children and secure a brighter future for our country.”

But to obtain that “brighter future” in a rapidly changing, technology-driven world of computers, mobile devices, video games and Internet social media, the nation’s youth must learn that self-worth is gained through hard work in school rooms in their communities, and the “school rooms of nature.”

“[Theodore Roosevelt was] one of my favorite presidents, one



to preserve them for our children and grandchildren. Today, however, we are losing touch with too many of these places and proud traditions that have helped make [America] special ... We will work to connect these outdoor spaces to each other, and to reconnect Americans to them.”

Through February 2013, the America’s Great Outdoors initiative included the designation of over two million additional acres of wilderness, three more national parks, and more than 1,000 miles of “wild and scenic rivers” as federally protected.

As there is a wide “patchwork of groups” ranging from government entities to nongovernmental organizations to ordinary citizens—with an interest in such resources, the Obama Administration

held many “listening sessions” with thousands of Americans to determine how to best use protected lands.

From those discussions, the concept of a Conservation Service Corps (CSC) came to light as a way for the country to unify under the banner of land preservation. This was not unlike BSA’s ArrowCorps5 work for the National Park Service through its Order of the Arrow society of honor campers during the George W. Bush Administration. Either way, volunteer service performed by the country’s youth would ensure its success.

In BSA’s 2010 Annual Report to the Nation, it noted that Scouting volunteers donated an average of 20 hours a month to community service projects, which totaled over 273 million hours. This volunteerism equaled about \$5 billion given to the nation over the year.

And of these millions of service hours, 56,000 Eagle Scout projects accounted for \$210 million “in service to schools, churches, and communities across the nation.”

And as BSA delegates proudly pointed out to the President, "The Boy Scouts of America is where young people can learn what those values mean, commit them to memory, and—more important—put them into practice."

Additionally, with similar premise as First Lady Michelle Obama's "Let's Move" campaign against childhood obesity, BSA supports and promotes an active lifestyle of healthy living through sports, recreation, and strenuous achievement at the nation's numerous camps and National High Adventure Bases, at which over a million Scouts participated in its centennial year.



At BSA's 2011 Annual National Meeting in San Diego, California, the organization introduced a new partnership with the White House aimed at encouraging members to "engage, educate, and empower youth to adopt a healthy lifestyle that includes regular physical activity and good nutrition." Working in tandem with the President's Council on Fitness, Sports and Nutrition (PCFSN) and the First Lady's "Let's Move" campaign, Scouts and leaders worked to earn the President's Active Lifestyle Awards through the President's Challenge initiative.

The President's Challenge is the premier program offered by the government's Council on Fitness. It is administered by the Amateur Athletic Union, which "helps people of all ages and abilities increase their physical activity and improve their fitness through research-based information, easy-to-use tools, and friendly motivation." Founded in the 1960s, with an initial program consisting only of youth fitness testing, the Council on Fitness expanded to include adult fitness tests and the President's Active Lifestyle Award (PALA).

PALA is designed for participation by children from the age of six through adulthood. It encourages activity at least 60 minutes a day, five days a week for eight weeks, for youths under 18 years of age, and for 30 minutes a day for adults. Alternative challenges are 13,000 steps a day for boys, 11,000 steps for girls, and 8,500 steps a day for adults. Successful participants receive an official patch.

On February 16, 2011, nine youthful members of BSA passed through security checkpoints at the White House.

Fresh from meetings with Speaker of the House John Boehner, Defense Secretary and Distinguished Eagle Scout Robert Gates, CIA Director Leon Panetta, and chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Admiral Mike Mullen, the delegation made its way down the long corridors to the Oval Office anteroom.

Soon the two large doors opened and a smiling president greeted the Scouts.

"President Obama had such a magnificent personality," recalled Order of the Arrow National Chief Jonathan Hillis. "He really just drew us in.

National Venturing President Jennifer Lowe of Utah agreed. "I was so nervous," she said. "I kept reminding myself that this was real. We're in the Oval Office with the President!" Obama opened the conversation by asking each Scout his or her name and shaking everyone's hand.



"We introduced ourselves," recalled Lowe, "and he asked about the Venturing program."

Led to the famed Resolute presidential desk made from timbers of the H.M.S. Resolute (a British Royal Navy vessel caught in the ice of the Arctic Circle in 1854, abandoned, and salvaged by an American whaling ship in 1855), some of its timbers were made into a desk and given to President Rutherford B. Hayes in 1880 by a grateful Queen Victoria.

Lowe, assigned to present BSA's Annual Report to the president, gently opened the case, held it briefly for White House photographer Pete Souza to capture, then and turned it over to a cheerfully smiling and receptive President Obama.

"It was really significant," said Lowe, "because it was the one hundredth year report."

After a few more photographs, the delegation was led out of the Oval Office. However, its members still were coming to the realization that Scouting had taken them to meet the President of the United States. "That was a pretty unforgettable experience," recalled Hillis. "I'll be telling my grandkids about [it] one day."

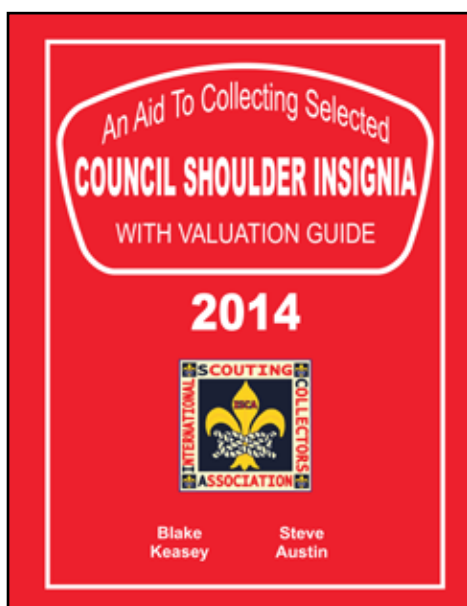
